
# **Roads Scholars Tour Evaluation Summaries 2014-2019**





#### Introduction

The Ohio State University Roads Scholars Tour provides faculty and administrators the opportunity to travel Ohio learning about research, teaching and community engagement connections with businesses, non-profit organizations, human services and other partners.

The Roads Scholars Tour is one of the longest standing university tours of its kind, offering not only opportunities for partnerships external to the university, but also opportunities for faculty to build their networks at Ohio State.

As one of Ohio's land-grant universities it is vital that our impact extend beyond our campuses to our communities through research, teaching and learning in mutually beneficial and meaningful ways.

#### Roads Scholars Tour Evaluation Summaries (2014-2019)

Overall, participants were highly satisfied with the opportunities to learn more about Ohio State, including regional campuses, as well as Ohio State's partnerships across the state. Participants appreciated opportunities to expand their networks with other faculty and administrators. Participants especially liked opportunities to engage with the President, the Provost, and student leaders. The Outreach and Engagement staff consistently received high marks with regards to organization and execution of the Tour.

#### Opportunities for improvement include:

- More meaningful connections with other participants, partners, and community
- Connecting the Tour to participants' research, scholarship, and teaching
- Slowing the pace to create opportunities for deeper learning and conversation
- Moving from a "show and tell" format to one with more intentionality and connection

- Not enough opportunities for meaningful connection
